STRUCTURE

- Paragraph 1
 - Selected work, director, release year.
 - Plot reference + definition with adjectives
 - Plot summary
- Paragraph 2
 - 2 to 3 film or tv series review items: name them, and define them.
- Paragraph 3
 - 2 to 3 film or tv series review items: name them, and define them.
- Paragraph 4
 - Conclusion: final remark highlighting the most positive and/or negative aspects of the selected work + comment inviting people to watch it.

WRITING & REGISTER TIPS

- Informal language accepted.
- It is compulsory to make reference to film/TV series elements.
- It is compulsory to make use of proper adjectives to properly define such film/TV series elements.

FILM REVIEW ELEMENTS

- 1. Plot:** The storyline and its structure. Assess how engaging, coherent, and original the plot is.
- 2. Characters / Cast:** The depth and development of the characters. Evaluate how relatable, believable, and well-acted the characters are.
- 3. Pacing:** The speed and rhythm of the narrative. Determine if the movie maintains a good flow or if there are parts that drag or feel rushed.
- 4. Dialogue:** The quality and believability of the spoken lines. Consider if the dialogue feels natural and serves to advance the plot and develop characters.
- 5. Direction:** The effectiveness of the director in telling the story. Look at the

director's vision, style, and how well they guide the cast and crew.

6. Cinematography: The visual aspects of the film, including shot composition, lighting, and camera work. Examine how visually appealing and effective the imagery is in conveying the story's tone.

7. Editing: The pacing and coherence of scene transitions and narrative structure. Check for smoothness and how well the editing supports the film's overall rhythm.

8. Soundtrack: The use of music and sound effects. Consider how well the soundtrack enhances the mood, complements the story, and integrates with the visual elements.

9. Special Effects: The quality and believability of CGI and practical effects. Evaluate how these effects enhance the story and whether they appear realistic and well-integrated.

10. Themes: The underlying messages and concepts. Reflect on the depth and relevance of the themes and how effectively they are communicated.

11. Setting and Production Design: The locations, sets, and props used in the film. Assess the attention to detail and how convincingly the setting supports the story.
